WELCOME TO CANYONLANDS

Utah's Most Remote and Vast National Park

Canyonlands National Park is the largest and wildest of Utah's national parks — 337,598 acres of red rock canyons, mesas, and river gorges carved by the Colorado and Green Rivers. Unlike Zion or Arches, Canyonlands is not a single destination. It is divided into three separate districts: Island in the Sky, The Needles, and The Maze — each requiring a different drive and offering a completely different experience.

This is a park for those who want the real Utah — vast, remote, and genuinely wild. Island in the Sky is accessible and jaw-dropping. The Needles is adventurous and colorful. The Maze is one of the most remote places in the contiguous United States.

PLANNING YOUR TRIP

Best Time to Visit Canyonlands National Park

Canyonlands sits at 4,000–6,000 feet elevation. Spring and fall are ideal. Summer heat is extreme in the canyon areas, and winter can close backcountry roads entirely.

The most demanding day hike in Island in the Sky — a full circuit around Upheaval Dome with dramatic canyon views. Far fewer visitors than the easy rim walks, delivering a true backcountry feeling without requiring a permit. -> Most strenuous Island in the Sky day hike — early start essential -> No permit required for day use — unlike most long Canyonlands trails -> Carry 3+ liters of water; no water sources on the route -> Combine with the Upheaval Dome viewpoints for a complete day		A flat, easy trail along the Island in the Sky mesa rim to a dramatic overlook of the White Rim Road — the famous 4WD route that encircles the mesa 1,200 feet below. Best afternoon hike when the canyon walls glow in warm light. -> Completely flat and easy — suitable for all ages and fitness levels -> Best in late afternoon for warm canyon lighting -> Trailhead near Grand View Point — can be combined into a longer rim walk -> The White Rim Road 1,200 feet below is one of the great Utah 4WD routes	

- > Desert Bistro — Moab's finest farm-to-table restaurant. Reserve ahead.
- > Jailhouse Cafe — Moab's BEST breakfast spot! Reserve ahead.
- > Moab Brewery — post-hike beers and solid pub food. No reservations needed.
- > Moab Diner — classic breakfast, opens 6am. pre-hike fuel stop.
- > Love Muffin — best coffee in Moab. Perfect early

- > Lamplight Restaurant (Monticello) — best sit-down option in town, American comfort food.
- > MD Ranch Cookhouse — Western-style meals, good for families.
- > Monticello City Market — best grocery stock-up before heading to The Needles.
- > Pack your own food — no restaurants between Monticello and The Needles visitor center.

WARNING — NO FOOD OR WATER IN THE PARK

There is absolutely no food or water available inside any Canyonlands district. This is a serious wilderness park. Bring far more water and food than you think you need, especially for The Needles and Maze. The general rule: 1 liter of water per mile hiked in summer conditions.

Pro Tips — What No One Else Tells You

BEATING THE CROWDS	WHAT TO PACK
-> Mesa Arch: arrive 45 minutes before sunrise — the lot fills by 6:30am -> Grand View Point sees far fewer visitors after 11am when tour groups leave -> The Needles is significantly less crowded than Island in the Sky year-round -> October is ideal: fall colors in the canyon, dramatically fewer visitors -> Horseshoe Canyon unit is almost never crowded and is utterly spectacular	-> 4+ liters of water for any hike over 5 miles — no water in the park -> Download offline maps at home — zero cell service throughout the park -> Sunscreen and a hat — the mesa top has zero shade and intense UV -> Trekking poles for Syncline Loop and any Needles backcountry hiking -> Emergency shelter and extra food for any backcountry trip — this is remote country -> Fill up on gas in Moab or Monticello — no fuel anywhere near the park

Newspaper Rock — Do Not Miss

On the drive to The Needles (UT-211), stop at Newspaper Rock State Historic Monument — a single sandstone panel covered with over 2,000 years of petroglyphs from multiple Native American cultures. It is one of the largest collections of petroglyphs in the country, it is free to visit, and most Canyonlands visitors drive right past it.

WARNING — FLASH FLOOD RISK IN BACKCOUNTRY

Flash floods are a real danger in Canyonlands slot canyons and washes. The Needles backcountry has multiple wash crossings that can flash flood with no warning. Always check weather forecasts at [NPS.gov/cany](https://www.nps.gov/cany) before backcountry trips. Never camp in a dry wash regardless of current sky conditions.
