TRAIL OVERVIEW

A short but relentlessly steep climb to a rocky overlook with sweeping views, rebuilt and rerouted after the devastating 2016 Chimney Tops 2 Fire, which started near this trail and went on to reach Gatlinburg. The final exposed rock scramble to the true double-peaked summit has remained closed since the fire for safety reasons; the current maintained trail ends at an overlook below it.

TRAILHEAD + LOGISTICS

Chimney Tops Trailhead, on Newfound Gap Road, a short drive from Sugarlands.

CROWD STRATEGY

Popular and often crowded on the narrow trail itself, which can create real bottlenecks on busy weekends.

PHOTOGRAPHY TIPS

The overlook near the trail's end delivers a genuinely dramatic view over the surrounding ridgelines; best in clear morning light before afternoon haze thickens.

LOCAL INSIDER TIP

This is a shorter but more relentlessly steep trail than its mileage suggests — don't underestimate it based on distance alone.

TRAIL TIPS + WARNINGS

Steep drop-offs near the endpoint; the closed summit scramble beyond the maintained trail is off-limits and genuinely dangerous — respect the closure.

PERMITS + ACCESS

The Parking Tag, Firefly Lottery + Backcountry Permits

The parking tag is the one requirement that touches nearly every visitor; everything else in this table applies only to specific activities.

Parking anywhere over 15 minutes	YES (parking tag)	Recreation.gov, visitor centers, or trailhead kiosks	\$5/day, \$15/week, \$40/year
Synchronous firefly event (Elkmont, May 20–27, 2026)	YES (lottery)	Recreation.gov lottery, opens April 24, closes April 27	\$1 application + \$29 if selected
Backcountry camping	YES	Free self-registration / permit system via the park's backcountry office	Nightly per-person fee applies
LeConte Lodge (summit lodging)	YES (reservation)	Book directly through LeConte Lodge, extremely limited and competitive	Lodge rate applies
Fishing	YES	Tennessee or North Carolina state fishing license, valid park-wide	State license fee applies

LECONTE LODGE — BOOK ALMOST A YEAR AHEAD

The only lodging inside the park, reachable exclusively on foot via one of five trails (Alum Cave is the shortest and most popular), LeConte Lodge has no road access, no electricity beyond generators, and a reservation system that routinely fills a year in advance for peak season dates. If summiting Mount LeConte is a priority, start checking availability as early as the lodge allows.

DAY-BY-DAY

The Perfect 3-Day Smokies Itinerary

This itinerary assumes a Gatlinburg or Townsend base on the Tennessee side, with an optional extension into North Carolina.

D1

Cades Cove + Abrams Falls

Region: **Cades Cove** Arrive at dawn for wildlife + traffic

MORNING

- Drive the Cades Cove Loop Road at first light for the best wildlife activity and the least traffic.
- Stop at the Cable Mill Historic Area and the historic churches along the loop.

AFTERNOON

- Hike Abrams Falls from its spur trailhead on the loop.
- Return to Gatlinburg or Townsend for the evening; buy your parking tag if you haven't already.

D2

Newfound Gap Road + Kuwohi

Region: **Newfound Gap / Kuwohi** Cross into North Carolina for the day

MORNING

- Drive Newfound Gap Road, stopping at the Newfound Gap overlook on the state line.
- Continue to Kuwohi (Clingmans Dome) for the observation tower, or add Andrews Bald if the tower crowd is heavy.

AFTERNOON

- Charles Bunion via the Appalachian Trail from Newfound Gap, if you have the legs and time for a full-day hike.
- Otherwise, continue into Cherokee, NC for the afternoon and evening.
